

The Rise of the Remnant

“I Multiply What I Have Become”

Core Teaching

The final stage of discipleship is multiplication. A disciple is not the end point of the process. They are a vessel through which the pattern continues.

What has been formed must now be reproduced.

If transformation stops at the individual, it will not endure. What is not multiplied will eventually diminish. The design of the Kingdom is not preservation through isolation, but expansion through replication.

The early assembly did not grow through events or gatherings alone. It expanded through lives that carried the pattern and established it in others. House by house, person by person, the same foundation was reproduced.

A true disciple does not only learn the pattern. They become the pattern. Their life reflects separation, submission to truth, covenant fellowship, covenant sealing, and the altar of prayer. From this place, they are able to guide others into the same alignment.

Authority is proven through replication. What is truly established within a person will be evident in what they can reproduce in others.

This is the rise of the remnant — not a group that gathers information, but a people who carry, live, and multiply the pattern.

Key Scriptures

- Matthew 28:19–20

“Go therefore and make disciples of all nations...”

- Acts 2:47

“And the Lord added to the church daily those who were being saved.”

- Isaiah 2:2–3

“...Many people shall come and say, ‘Come, and let us go up... He will teach us His ways...’”

Practical Application

Begin by recognizing that your discipleship is not complete until it is expressed through multiplication. Do not wait for ideal conditions or large numbers. Start where you are.

Establish a house with even two or three people. Keep it simple, consistent, and aligned with the pattern you have received.

Teach the four gateways clearly and sequentially. Walk others through the same process you have walked. Do not modify the structure. Preserve the pattern.

Lead them through the proclamation of separation. Guide them into submission to truth. Establish them in fellowship, communion, and prayer. Help them build the same rhythm of life.

Discipleship is not information transfer. It is life formation. Therefore, walk with those you teach. Model what you instruct.

As each person becomes established, they must also be sent to multiply. In this way, the pattern continues without distortion.

Proclamation or Exercise

Declare:

“I am not the end. I am a vessel of multiplication. What has been formed in me will be formed in others. I will teach, establish, and release. I will not hold what must be multiplied.”

Then take immediate action. Identify at least one or two people to begin discipling. Establish your first gathering and begin walking them through the pattern without delay.

Final War Declaration (Closing the Series)

“I have come out.

I have aligned.

I am no longer divided.

I am no longer disconnected.

I am no longer powerless.

I walk in truth.

I walk in covenant.

I walk in remembrance.

I walk in fire.

I am the remnant.

I am part of the NeXoDuS.

I walk the ancient paths — and I will not turn back.”

Higher Level Notes (For Advanced Study)

Multiplication is the evidence of maturity. A disciple who cannot reproduce the pattern has not yet fully embodied it.

The remnant is not defined by size, but by alignment and function. It consists of those who walk in the established pattern and carry it without compromise.

House-based discipleship preserves purity and consistency. It prevents dependence on centralized structures and maintains the integrity of the teaching.

When replication is consistent, growth becomes organic and sustained. This reflects the original pattern and ensures that what was established continues across generations.
